

The First Roman Catholic Church and Cemetery

St. Andrews, New Brunswick

Each year many people visit the Old Roman Catholic Cemetery in St. Andrews-By-The-Sea. Some come to pay their respect to those of yesteryear; others come out for curiosity, but most try to look for a connection to their family history. This document was prepared as a quick guide to inform people interested in their genealogy. This document has an alphabetical listing of people buried in the cemetery, as well as their locations.

The first Catholic Cemetery

The first Catholic cemetery was first used in 1825, and was built adjacent to the church. The very first burial was of Catherine Cavanaugh on March 25, 1825. The cemetery was fully operational until 1859, when burials became illegal in town limits.

Up until 1977, the graveyard remained untouched. Almost one hundred and twenty year had taken their toll on the stones. The civil trust contributed \$3,500 to wash all of the stones, reset and repair them. At that time the present plaque was place.

The first Catholic Church

The very first Catholic Church in St. Andrews was finished in 1825 on the corner of Parr and Mary Streets. Before it was built, though, a meeting was held and the trustees were named: Thomas Dunn, Peter Doran, Henry O'Neil and John Lockary. At the time a collection of 30 pounds was organized to jump-start the construction.

In 1824, the congregation erected the building on the land, the lots being donated by John Dunn. The building was small and unpretentious, a mere 28 x 40 feet. A message was written on the church, stating: "Erected to the honor of the only true and living God. 1825."

The very first baptism was of E. J. Carney and occurred on December 27, 1827. The first marriage occurred two days earlier in the same year and was of Robert McEveny and Elizabeth Thompson, who were married by the first priest, Father John Cummings.

Later, 11 feet were added to the length of the church and a spire was erected. A bell was added as well, which came as a present from John Wilson of Chamcook.

In the same year the church was finished, the first rectory was built, this being diagonal from the church lot, facing Parr Street.

There is no record in the parish archives of there being a catholic school, but the following item from a St. Stephen newspaper would indicate that there was a Catholic school prior to 1875, when the following was published: "The Roman Catholic school at St. Andrews is closed and the children who attended it are now going to public schools."

Sixty years later the old church had proved inadequate for the growing congregation. It was in 1885 that the present church, erected on the corner of Parr and King Streets was built.

The old church remained until 1903, when a portion of the church was removed and used as a parish hall and gymnasium. The hall was sold in 1914 and now it forms the back of the restaurant "L'Europe" on King Street and is used as a stage.
